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## SPEAKERS

### **Sonia Kupfer, MD**, Associate Professor of Medicine, University of Chicago Medicine



Dr. Sonia Kupfer is director of the Gastrointestinal Cancer Risk and Prevention Clinic at the University of Chicago Medicine. Her work in this clinic is focused on diagnosing and treating patients with genetic disorders such as hereditary gastrointestinal cancer syndromes including hereditary stomach cancers. Her research is funded by the National Institutes of Health. She is a past president and council member of the Collaborative Group of the Americas on Inherited Gastrointestinal Cancers (CGA-IGC). Dr. Kupfer attended the International Gastric Cancer Linkage Consortium meeting in March 2019 and will help update the guidelines for evaluation and management of hereditary diffuse gastric cancer.

### **Kevin Roggin, MD**, Professor of Surgery, University of Chicago Medicine



A board-certified general surgeon and surgical oncologist, Dr. Kevin Roggin specializes in the surgical treatment of complex uppergastrointestinal tract and hepato-pancreato-biliary (HPB) cancers (stomach, pancreas, liver, gall-bladder, gastrointestinal stromal tumors (GIST), sarcomas, extrahepatic bile duct cholangiocarcinoma). Dr. Roggin performs advanced robotic HPB procedures, including robotic pancreaticoduodenectomy (Whipple procedure), robotic distal pancreatectomy/splenectomy, robotic liver surgery and robotic gastric surgery.

### **Deepa Sheth, MD**, Assistant Professor of Medicine, University of Chicago Medicine



Dr. Deepa Sheth is an oncology radiologist who believes women should be empowered with options for the early detection, diagnosis and treatment of breast cancer. Dr. Sheth focuses on advanced forms of breast imaging, including three-dimensional mammography (tomosynthesis), automated whole breast ultrasound (AWBUS), and breast magnetic resonance imaging (MRI). She champions continuing education for radiologists and technicians.

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**Carol Semrad, MD**, Professor of Medicine, University of Chicago Medicine



Dr. Carol Semrad is a gastroenterologist, specializing in small bowel diseases (celiac disease, diarrhea, malabsorption) and nutrition. She is a leader in the use of small bowel endoscopy (video capsule endoscopy and double balloon enteroscopy) for management of small bowel bleeding, ulcers, and tumors. She is member of the medical leadership team at the University of Chicago Celiac Disease Center. Dr. Semrad sees patients before and after gastrectomy for nutrition evaluation, counseling and repletion.

**Namrata Setia, MD**, Assistant Professor of Pathology, University of Chicago Medicine



Dr. Namrata Setia is a board-certified pathologist who specializes in anatomical pathology at the University of Chicago Medicine. Dr. Setia reviews all diffuse gastric cancer cases. She has published on familial gastric cancer.

**Jessica Stoll, MS, CGC**, Genetic Counselor, Assistant Director, Gastrointestinal Cancer Risk and Prevention Clinic, University of Chicago Medicine



Jessica Stoll is a board-certified genetic counselor in the section of gastroenterology at the University of Chicago Medicine. She received a bachelor's degree in biological sciences from the University of Southern California and a master's degree in genetic counseling from Northwestern University. Her clinical interests include hereditary gastrointestinal cancer susceptibility syndromes, hereditary pancreatitis and inflammatory bowel disease. She is also actively involved in educational programs, giving presentations at UChicago Medicine and supervising genetic counseling students.

**Jeremy L. Davis, MD**, Assistant Research Physician, National Institutes of Health Clinical Center



Dr. Jeremy L. Davis is a surgical oncologist whose research focus is in upper gastrointestinal tract malignancy, including stomach, pancreas and hepatobiliary cancers. He is the principal investigator for trials aimed at elucidating the drivers of metastasis in stomach cancers, including inherited forms of stomach cancer.

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
